The two sons work hard to provide for the family and the yearly sacrifices for God through farming and tending the sheep. Cain, an introverted farmer, is jealous of the attention and love Abel gets and dreams of the day where he can get the recognition he craves.

When Cain notices Abel sneaking out of their home one night after dinner, he follows him into a clearing and learns a horrifying secret: his brother is making sacrificial rituals to an unknown presence. Cain, in shock, turns to his closest friend, Nur, besides his wife for advice on what to do on Abel's strange behavior. Nur tells Cain to handle it himself because his parents and even God would not believe him. Cain refuses this advice and goes to the mother about Abel, but she brushes him off in preparation for the sacrifice for God that is coming up. He then goes to the father and is ignored as well; Cain angrily leaves and goes to tell Nur he accepts her advice.

Abel sneaks out the next night and Cain follows. When Abel begins to mutilate one of his sheep, Cain intervenes and demands to know who Abel has been talking to. A voice with no visible body speaks and declares the youngest son as their own before taking Abel. Cain stumbles home and finds that his parents have forgotten Abel and begin to worry about his frantic behavior when he asks about the youngest son. He then goes to tell Nur about what happened, but she does not remember Abel.
